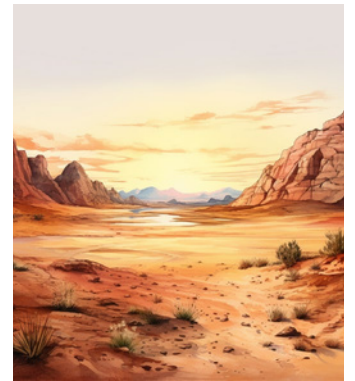
THE MESORAH: VALUING TRADITIONS AND ENSURING CONTINUITY
